**Wendy Pradt Lougee, University of Minnesota**

Wendy Pradt Lougee is University Librarian and McKnight Presidential Professor at the University of Minnesota–Twin Cities since 2002. Prior to coming to University of Minnesota, Lougee held several positions at the University of Michigan over a 20-year period, including Director of the Harlan Hatcher Graduate Library and Associate Director of the University Library system for Digital Library Services. Her work in launching and developing a premier digital library program at Michigan was recognized with the American Library Association’s Hugh Atkinson Award (2003), Computerworld Honors Program Laureate (2002) and Michigan’s Walter H. **Winston Tabb, Johns Hopkins University**

Currently serving as Sheridan Dean of University Libraries and Museums at the Johns Hopkins University and as Vice Provost for the Arts, Winston Tabb’s chief current research interest is the identification of core intellectual property norms needed to advance the mission of libraries



both nationally and across borders. He has served the International Federation of Library Associations and Institutions (IFLA) variously as Chair of the Professional Committee, and member of the Executive Committee, Governing Board and Professional Board. He currently chairs IFLA’s Copyright and Other Legal Matters Committee and is a member of the IFLA-International Publishers Association Steering Committee. He is also a member of the boards of the Association of Research Libraries, the Council on Library and Information Resources, the Johns Hopkins Press, and the National Information Standards Organization (NISO).

**Carol Tenopir, University of Tennessee, Knoxville**

Carol Tenopir is a professor at the School of Information Sciences at the University of Tennessee, Knoxville and the Director of Research for the College of Communication and Information, and Director of the Center for Information and Communication Studies. Her areas of teaching and research include: information access and retrieval, electronic publishing, the information industry, online resources, and the impact of technology on reference librarians and scientists. Dr. Tenopir has published over 200 journal articles, is a frequent speaker at professional conferences, and since 1983 has written the "Online Databases" column for Library Journal. She is the recipient of the 1993 Outstanding Information Science Teacher Award from the American Society for Information Science/Institute for Scientific Information and the 2000 ALISE Award for Teaching Excellence. She also received the 2002 American Society for Information Science & Technology, Research Award and the 2004 International Information Industry Lifetime Achievement Award.
