

## **Guide for Authors**

1. Papers must be in English
2. Papers for publication should be uploaded at the above URL. There are no page charges or submission fees. Authors should however keep the size of their manuscripts to a maximum of 35 double spaced pages including references, tables and figures.

Submission of a paper will be held to imply that it contains original unpublished work and is not being submitted for publication elsewhere. Upon acceptance of an article, author(s) will be asked to transfer copyright of the article to the publisher. This transfer will ensure the widest possible dissemination of information.

**DO NOT MAIL A COPY OF YOUR PAPER TO THE EDITOR.** Please follow these four steps when submitting your paper:

- i. Register in the online submission system with a unique username. The system will email your nominated email account with a password.
- ii. Check your nominated email account and keep the password (or change it if you wish) safe for later reference.
- iii. Log in to the system using your unique username and password.
- iv. Systematically provide the necessary information about your paper, then upload your paper in the appropriate format.

Accepted papers are submitted electronically. See instructions at the web URL. Please adhere strictly to the general instructions below on style, arrangement and, in particular, the reference style of the Journal.

3. Manuscripts should be double spaced, with wide margins. All pages should be numbered consequently. Titles and subtitles should be short. References, tables, and legends for the figures should be printed on separate pages.

4. The first page of the manuscript should contain the following information:

- i. The title
- ii. An abstract of not more than 100 words.
- iii. Several key words that best describe your paper
- iv. At least one code from the Classification System for Journal Articles as used by the Journal of Economic Literature (JEL) that best describes your paper

**Do not include names, affiliations or other identifying information on the first page** unless the editor has requested that this information be included.

5. Acknowledgements and information on grants received can be given in a first footnote, which should not be included in the consecutive numbering of footnotes. only when the editor has requested inclusion of names and other information.

6. Footnotes should be kept to a minimum and numbered consecutively throughout the text with superscript Arabic numerals.

7. Displayed formulae should be numbered consecutively throughout the manuscript as (1), (2), etc. against the right-hand margin of the page. In cases where the derivation of formulae has been abbreviated, it is of great help to the referees if the full derivation can be presented on a separate sheet (not to be published).

8. References to publications should be as follows: 'Smith (1992) reported that...' or 'This problem has been studied previously (e.g., Smith et al., 1969)'. The author should make sure that there is a strict one-to-one correspondence between the names and years in the text and those on the list. The list of references should appear at the end of the main text (after any appendices, but before tables and legends for figures). It should be double spaced and listed in alphabetical order by author's name.

References should appear as follows:

*For monographs*

Hawawini, G. and I. Swary, 1990, Mergers and Acquisitions in the U.S. Banking Industry: Evidence from the Capital Markets (North-Holland, Amsterdam).

For contributions to collective works Brunner, K. and A.H. Meltzer, 1990, Money supply. In: Friedman, B.M., Hahn, F. (Eds.), Handbook of Monetary Economics, Vol. 1. North-Holland, Amsterdam, pp. 357-396.

*For periodicals*

Griffiths, W., Judge, G., 1992, Testing and estimating location vectors when the error covariance matrix is unknown. Journal of Econometrics 54, 121-138.

*For unpublished material*

Hermalin, B., Weisbach, M., 1995. Endogenously chosen boards and their monitoring of the CEO. Unpublished working paper. University of California, Berkeley.

Note that journal titles should not be abbreviated.

9. Illustrations will be reproduced from originals supplied by the author. Please provide all illustrations electronically. Care should be taken that lettering and symbols are of a comparable size. The illustrations should not be inserted in the text. All graphs and diagrams should be referred to as figures, and should be numbered consecutively in the text in Arabic numerals.

10. Tables should be numbered consecutively in the text in Arabic numerals and printed on separate sheets.

Any manuscript which does not conform to the above instructions may be returned for the necessary revision before publication.

11. Page proofs will be sent by email to the corresponding author. Proofs should be corrected carefully; the responsibility for detecting errors lies with the author. Corrections should be restricted to instances in which the proof is at variance with the manuscript. Extensive alterations will be charged. Fifty reprints of each paper are supplied free of charge to the corresponding author; additional reprints are available at cost if they are ordered when the proof is returned.
