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DESCRIPTION

The concept of **Case Studies in Fire Safety** is to allow researchers and practicing fire safety engineers to present fresh ideas on the development of new fire science or application of fire research to actual projects, in a case study context. All papers are subjected to peer review and publication times are quick.

Submitted articles may be in the form of short communications on key professional issues or technologies, or more extended papers of a focussed research or engineering/applications nature, but not more than about 8 published pages long (about 12-14 pages of a 12 point Word document).

Submissions should be short, sharp papers and short communications which include: • Case studies developed by academics or researchers to illustrate a new fire science or engineering principle, or a new technology • Studies of the application of fire science and engineering to a real project or projects • Case studies which solve an engineering problem for multiple projects or the profession generally • Cases of failure analysis or research that may have reached even a negative • Short communications on industry or professional issues of concern internationally in relation to fire science and engineering

The list of topics *Case Studies in Fire Safety* covers is wide, and includes (but is not limited to): fire **chemistry** and **physics, fire dynamics** (including gas explosions), active **fire protection systems** (including detection and suppression), fire performance of structures, passive **fire protection methods**, people/fire **interactions** (physical, physiological and psychological), **fire safety management**, assessment and quantification of fire risk (including acceptability of risk), fire **investigation**, fire **safety design** (including consumer items, industrial plant, transportation, buildings), fire safety **legislation**, and fire safety **education**.

This is an ideal publication for the rapid publication and unfettered global promotion of fire engineering and fire research work. The journal will publish new and novel case studies, but will also provide a forum for the publication of high quality descriptions of classic fire safety design and fire engineering problems and solutions. Case studies submitted to the journal should be no more than 6 pages in length. Some exceptions will be made if there is a compelling reason to include extra information.

All submissions will be evaluated for technical soundness and general interest to both the research community and practitioners, before a decision is made to send to review.

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
