

The *Journal of Obstetric, Gynecologic, & Neonatal Nursing (JOGNN)* abides by the policies of its publisher Elsevier, the International Committee of Medical Journal Editors (ICMJE), the Council of Science Editors (CSE), and the Committee on Publication Ethics (COPE).

Article Withdrawal

To ensure the integrity and completeness of the scholarly record, *JOGNN* adheres to the policy of Elsevier regarding the withdrawal of published articles. This may include withdrawal, retraction, removal, or replacement. See a full explanation [here](#).

Author Appeals

The decisions of *JOGNN*'s editors are final. However, authors may appeal a rejection by sending an email notification to jognn@awhonn.org within 30 days of receipt of the decision. The appeal must provide detailed evidence that the peer review process was flawed or that substantive factual errors were made by the reviewers and/or editors. Appeals will be reviewed by the editorial team, and a decision will be rendered by the handling editor.

Authorship

JOGNN does not permit co-first authors or notes in the manuscript describing the degree of author contribution.

JOGNN limits the number of authors to six in most cases. The editors will consider reasonable requests for more than six authors that are justified in the cover letter. Group authorship is permitted when the work is conducted by a large collaboration or for multisite clinical trials. *JOGNN* follows the current edition of the *Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association* (APA) regarding format for group authors, and individual members may be included in an acknowledgement at the discretion of the editor.

Data Sharing for Clinical Trials

JOGNN follows the standards of the ICMJE, which indicate that reports of clinical trial results must include a data sharing statement. See the ICMJE requirements [here](#).

Editorial Procedures and Peer Review

Upon initial editorial review, an editor may submit an editorial reject decision, which is generally made within one week of submission. This decision means that the manuscript is not appropriate for peer review and will proceed no further in the review process. Manuscripts deemed appropriate for peer review are sent to three independent peer reviewers, usually including one member of the Editorial Advisory Board, for evaluation. The handling editor considers the peer reviews together with the editor's own evaluation of the manuscript. Editors render accept, revise, reject decisions that are communicated via email to the manuscript's corresponding author. This first decision is usually made within 6 weeks of submission. An invitation to revise a manuscript does not guarantee its acceptance. After revision, a manuscript may be sent for additional peer review by the original or new reviewers at the discretion of the editor. All editorial decisions are final. These policies are consistent with Elsevier's [policy on editorial independence](#).

Institutional Review Board (IRB)/Ethics Committee Approval

Permissions

Authors must obtain permission from the original publisher to reuse, adapt, or modify any previously published materials. Please see the [JOGNN author guidelines](#) for more information.

Plagiarism, Text Recycling, and Duplicate Publication

Plagiarism is a form of scientific misconduct that harms all persons involved including the author of the work, the original author of the plagiarized material, and the reader. Plagiarism can occur when the words or ideas of another person are copied without attribution, when an author reuses large portions of text that they previously published (text-recycling or self-plagiarism), or when an author attempts to publish intellectual material that is substantially similar to previous publications (duplicate or redundant publication). Authors should not submit the same manuscript to multiple journals simultaneously. After revision, all manuscripts are screened for potential plagiarism with plagiarism detection software.

Similarly, authors should not preferentially cite their own publications or those of their colleagues, peers, or institutions, nor should they purposively omit relevant citations.

Preprints as Previous Publications

JOGNN allows papers that were previously deposited on preprint servers to be submitted for publication consideration. However, if the paper is accepted for publication, authors must update any preprint versions with a link to the final published article in *JOGNN*. All submissions are subject to peer review, and allowing the submission of preprint manuscripts does not guarantee acceptance. The submitting author of a paper that was previously deposited to a preprint server should provide a disclosure in the cover letter that includes the name and website of the server and the DOI of the preprint. Preprints are considered informally published works, and their use as references is generally discouraged. However, if such a reference is necessary, authors must follow the specifications of most current edition of the *Publication Manual of the APA*.

Supplementary Materials

Authors are encouraged to submit electronic supplementary material to support and enhance their research. Supplementary files may include additional tables or figures, applications, movies, animation sequences, high-resolution images, background datasets, sound clips, and more. To ensure that submitted material is directly usable, please ensure that data are provided in a recommended file format. Authors should submit the material with the article and include a concise and descriptive caption for each file. Please see the [JOGNN author guidelines](#) for more information.

Use of PhD(c) or PhDc as a Credential

JOGNN follows the [recommendations of the APA](#) regarding the use of PhD(c) or PhDc, which state that only earned degrees should be listed. To do otherwise can be seen as misleading or unethical.
