| Research Article | <p>Articles will vary considerably in length, with the specific constraint that the length be appropriate to the breadth and scope of the contents of the article. Minimum lengths are constrained only by the necessity of giving enough information for readers to understand the import of the study, and to reproduce it. Maximum lengths are not restricted by the style sheet, but are restricted by the capacity of readers of the journal to read the article. Brevity is encouraged. The journal also has many resources for disseminating extensive appended information relative to research articles.</p> | <p>Research Articles present empirical findings which are relevant to some aspect of the theory of phonetic behavior. As such, they are expected to present introductory material situating the study in the context of an aspect of phonetic theory, present methods, including analytic and statistical methods, in enough detail to reproduce the study, and discussion relating the findings of the study to the matters related in the introduction. The journal also publishes articles which do exhaustive reviews of part of the previous literature, though these are often by prior arrangement.</p> |
| Technical Article | <p>Articles follow the same formatting guidelines as Research Articles.</p> | <p>Technical Articles present state-of-the-art techniques for phonetic research. Such articles may present physiological, articulatory, or perceptual equipment, experimental protocols, or data processing, model-building or statistical modeling techniques. Technical Articles should present enough detail for readers to reasonably be able to reproduce the described research tool. Such articles are</p> |

| Letter to the Editor | <p>Letters to the Editor are required to be no longer than 1000 words and to contain no more than 4 citations of previous articles</p> | <p>Letters to the Editor allow authors and readers to offer brief and concise corrections or clarifications to previously published articles in the Journal of Phonetics.</p> <p>Letters are normally appropriate only in cases in which an author has particular knowledge of an issue due to experience with the specific research cited by or presented in the original article.</p> |
